BOTH MR. BALL AND BRITAIN'S LORD CARADON DEMANDED THE IMMEDIATE WITHDRAWAL OF SOVIET TROOPS.

LORD CARADON SAID THAT "WHEN WE SEE WHAT THE SOVIET UNION MIGHT DO TO AN ALLY, WE SHUDDER TO THINK WHAT IT MIGHT DO TO ANOTHER STATE."

FRANCES M. ARMAND BERARD USED THE WORD "DEPLORE" WHEN REFERRING TO THE SOVIET TROOPS. THE EVENTS IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA WERE OF "SUCH A NATURE AS TO WIPE OUT THE EUROPEAN DETENTE FOR WHICH MY COUNTRY HAS PARTICULARLY ENDEAVOURED TO ENCOURAGE," HE SAID.

AFTER THE MEETING, MUZIK TOLD NEWSMEN HE HAD BEEN IN TOUCH BOTH WITH PRAGUE AND WITH CZECH FOREIGN MINISTER JIRI HAJEK, WHO WAS UNDERSTOOD TO BE IN BELGRADE, YUGOSLAVIA. ASKED WHAT HE OPED THE COUNCIL WOULD DO, MUZIK SAID:

"I DON'T KNOW. WE WOULD LIKE TO HAVE THE SAME KIND OF SOVEREIGNTY WE HAD BEFORE."

FOLLOWING THE COUNCIL RECESS, THE WESTERN POWERS WENT IMMEDIATELY INTO PRIVATE CONSULATIONS ON A RESOLUTION THEY HOPED TO PUT BEFORE THE GROUP FOR A VOTE THURSAY.
