

CS - 1930 INTRO: EAST EUROPEAN POLEMICS

MUNICH, AUG 27 (CNR)- EAST EUROPE'S PUBLIC CONTROVERIES OVER THE CZECHOSLOVAK INVASION CONTINUED BEFORE TODAY'S SOVIET-CZECHOSLOVAK COMMUNIQUE.

HUNGARY AND BULGARIA MAINTAINED THE INVADERS' POLEMICS AGAINST RUMANIA AND YUGOSLAVIA, COMPARING THEM TO CHINA FOR DEMANDING TROOP WITHDRAWALS.

BUT RUMANIA'S PARTY NEWSPAPER SCIENTEIA PRINTED NOTHING ABOUT THE ISSUE, AND RUMANIAN RADIO AND TELEVISION REPORTING WAS ALSO GREATLY REDUCED.

THE HUNGARIAN PARTY NEWSPAPER NEPSZABADSAG ACCUSED YUGOSLAV LEADERS OF STRENGTHENING WHAT IT CALLED THE UNSPEAKABLE ATTACKS BY CHINESE PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI. IT ALSO ATTACKED RUMANIAN PRESIDENT AND PARTY LEADER NICOLAE CEAUSESCU FOR ALLEGEDLY GIVING ONE-SIDED REPORTS ON CZECHOSLOVAKIA.

RADIO BUDAPEST ALSO ATTACKED YUGOSLAV PRESIDENT JOSIP BROZ TITO MONDAY NIGHT. IT SAID HE WRONGLY THOUGHT WARSAW PACT MEMBERSHIP MADE IT IMPOSSIBLE FOR A COUNTRY TO FOLLOW ITS OWN COURSE.

RADIO SOFIA CHARGED MONDAY NIGHT THAT BUCHAREST, BELGRADE AND PEKING WERE --IN ITS WORDS-- SINGING THE JOINT CHORUS OF ANTI-COMMUNISM. IT ADDED THAT THE POSITIONS OF RIGHTEST AND LEFTIST OPPORTUNISM WERE MERGING.

YUGOSLAV RADIO SAID MONDAY CZECHOSLOVAKIA'S OCCUPATION WOULD REMAIN AN UNPARDONABLE DISGRACE, WHILE RADIO BUCHAREST ANNOUNCED TODAY THAT THE RUMANIAN WRITERS UNION HAD VOICED SOLIDARITY WITH THE CZECHOSLOVAK PEOPLE.

THE SOVIET PARTY NEWSPAPER PRAVDA, IN REPORTING THE END OF THE MOSCOW TALKS, VOWED THAT THE INVADING COUNTRIES WOULD STRUGGLE TO THE END TO PRESERVE CZECHOSLOVAK SOCIALISM.
