CS -- MORNING INTRO -- CZECHOSLOVAK SITUATION

MUNICH, SEPT. 9 (CNR) -- NORMALIZATION OF CZECHOSLOVAK LIFE IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE TODAY FOLLOWING AN ANNOUNCEMENT BY THE JUSTICE MINISTER THAT THE GOVERNMENT WOULD INTRODUCE TEMPORARY MEASURES TO DISSOLVE CERTAIN PUBLIC ASSEMBLIES.

INTERNATIONAL AIRLINES WILL BE ALLOWED TO RESUME FLYING INTO AND OUT OF CZECHOSLOVAKIA TODAY, RADIO CZECHOSLOVAKIA SAID LAST NIGHT.

CZECHOSLOVAK JUSTICE MINISTER BOHUSLAV KUCERA SAID SUNDAY ON RADIO PRAGUE THAT THE EXTRAORDINARY MEASURES WOULD COVER ASSEMBLIES THAT WERE AT VARIANCE WITH SIGNIFICANT FOREIGN OR INTERNAL POLITICAL INTERESTS.

THE MEASURES WOULD ALSO PERMIT THE DISSOLUTION OF ANY ORGANISATION WHOSE ACTIVITIES OPPOSED THE CONSTITUTION AND LEGAL CODE.

KUCERA SAID, HOWEVER, THAT HIS MINISTRY WOULD CONTINUE TO BE GUIDED BY ITS POST-JANUARY ACTION PROGRAM.

THE RESUMPTION OF CZECHOSLOVAK FOOTBALL WAS REPORTED LAST NIGHT TO HAVE BEEN HINDERED BECAUSE IT INVOLVED PUBLIC ASSEMBLIES.

EMANUEL BOSAK, CHAIRMAN OF THE CZECHOSLOVAK SPORTS UNION, SAID LAST NIGHT ON CZECHOSLOVAK TELEVISION THAT THERE WAS A PROBLEM IN RESUMING TOP FOOTBALL COMPETITION BECAUSE IT INVOLVED "THE ASSEMBLING OF A GREAT NUMBER OF PEOPLE" AND BECAUSE NOT ALL FIRST DIVISION FIELDS "ARE QUITE FREE."

THE SOVIET UNION AND POLAND, MEANWHILE, WARNED CZECHOSLOVAKIA OF A HARD STRUGGLE AHEAD, AS THE SOVIET-SUPPORTED RADIO STATION IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA LAUNCHED NEW ATTACKS ON THE COUNTRY'S PRESS AND SEVERAL LEADING JOURNALISTS AND WRITERS.

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
